

TEXTURE EVERYWHERE

Derwent Inktense Blocks


Grade Level: 3-12

MATERIALS:

- Derwent Inktense Blocks, Set of 12
- White Drawing Paper (use paper that can take on water)
- Textured Items
- Spray Bottle of Water
- Derwent Waterbrush, 4 Pack
- Wax or White Crayon
- Tape (optional)

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:


Texture is all around us. Gain awareness of patterns and textures in the everyday by learning to transfer pattern to paper by rubbing with a colour medium.






PROCEDURE:

Let's find some textures! Look around your home or classroom to find textured items to make your rubbings. You can use walls, plaques, and floors around your school. Textures are everywhere!



Place a paper over your textured object, and hold or tape your paper down. Rub over the paper with the side of an Inktense block to create a texture rubbing.



Tape or hold your paper down, but this time use a variety of colours to rub. We recommend you choose analogous colours (colours next to each other on the colour wheel - we like to call them "colour friends") so you don't end up with mud.






Since Inktense is watersoluble, you can use a waterbrush to activate parts of your design.



Now try another rubbing, but this time spray it with a fine mist of water and watch the pigment darken and spread.



Another fun technique is to take a piece of wax or a white crayon and make a texture rubbing.

Then paint over the rubbing with pigment from the Inktense blocks.





Pro Tips:

- Thinner papers will give you a more crisp imprint, but thicker papers handle the wet technique better.
- We recommend cutting paper into smaller sizes so students can make a sample book of textures. We cut 12"x18" sheets of paper into 4½"x6" pieces. After all the textures were made, students can bind them into a book.



 Be sure to supervise younger students if they are making rubbings on walls, as a slip of the paper might be permanent.
